

Publisher's Note

As I write this our fiftieth year of publishing is coming to a close, but it feels like there's still so much more to celebrate. This fall in-person events are in full swing, so we're partnering with bookstores and libraries to bring our authors to their readers in real life, at last. We introduced ourselves to thousands of fans at FanExpo with a busy booth packed with books; presented five author panels; and had numerous signings, of course.

We've also been celebrating our imprint, Rare Machines, which has been pulling in big nominations: André Forget's *In the City of Pigs* was longlisted for the Scotiabank Giller Prize; Tara McGowan-Ross's memoir *Nothing Will Be Different* is a finalist for the Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize for Nonfiction; and Rowan McCandless's *Persephone's Children* is a non-fiction finalist for the Governor General's Literary Awards. I'm so excited then to present two more Rare Machines titles releasing in the summer 2023 season: *Lump* by Nathan Whitlock, a sharp satire of domestic life, and *South* by Babak Lakghomi, a dark reimagining of a totalitarian society shot through with hallucinatory imagery.

The selection of books from the Dundurn imprint in summer 2023 really covers the breadth of our current publishing program: from political reference and local history to sport, memoir, and literary fiction, there really is a book here for every reader!

Summer is the perfect time to get on the road and discover somewhere new — or old. In *Ghost Towns of Ontario's Cottage Country*, Andrew Hind digs deep into local history and leads readers down winding back roads to the vestiges of villages long abandoned.

Denise Da Costa's novel *And the Walls Came Down* is a summer read bursting with heart. It's a deep examination of pride, family breakdown, and the insidiousness of mental illness through the eyes and diary scribblings of teenager Delia Ellis.

We have a clutch of memoirs including that of the World's Best Drinks Writer, Natalie MacLean. Wine Witch on Fire: Rising from the Ashes of Divorce, Defamation, and Drinking Too Much is an entertaining and powerful memoir perfect for a summer read — with or without a cool glass of Chardonnay. In My Name Is Not Harry, veteran journalist Haroon Siddiqui looks back at his life and career, his experiences of racism, and the growing Islamophobia in his native India and his adopted home of Canada.


I'm proud to be highlighting Black success by publishing *Black Enterprize* by D.A. Miller, an inspiring array of short bios of leaders and innovators, ranging from the first Black millionaire Robert Reed Church to record producer Dick Griffey and beauty product entrepreneur Lisa Price. A dark, satiric novel about a woman whose attempt to escape crises in her health and marriage end up causing more chaos.

In a single day, Cat finds out that she is pregnant, that a lump in her breast is the worst thing it could be, and that her husband has done something unforgivably creepy. Her life is stressful enough as it is: her career is stalled and being a stay-at-home mom for two young kids has become a grind.

Cat responds by falling apart in the messiest way possible. She tries to run away from her marriage and her life - a life that, on the outside, looks like middle-class success in the big city.

Told through multiple perspectives (including that of a very old dog), *Lump* is a dark comedy about marriage, motherhood, class, and cancer.



B, a journalist, travels to the South of an unnamed desert country for a mysterious mission to write a report about the recent strikes in an offshore oil rig. From the beginning of his trip, he is faced with a cruel and broken landscape of drought and decay, superstitious believers of evil winds and spirits, and corrupt entities focused on manipulation and censorship. As he tries to defend himself against his unknown enemies, we learn about his father's disappearance, his fading love with his wife, and his encounter with an unknown woman.

South is a hallucinatory novel about totalitarianism, surveillance, alienation, and guilt that questions the forces that control us.

Back in the low-income neighbourhood where she was raised, a young woman rediscovers the importance of community, home, and finding one's voice.

Just before the demolition of her childhood home in east Toronto, Delia Ellis returns to retrieve her beloved diary. Using it as a compass, she rediscovers life as a precocious teen growing up in the nineties.

Delia's writings reveal her anxieties following a move to Don Mount Court, a Toronto government housing complex, where she struggles to navigate life with an overprotective Jamaican mother and her father's inept replacement, "Neville the nuisance." Delia's troubles compound when she enlists her naive younger sister in a scheme to reunite their parents and recapture the idealistic life she yearns for.

Yet, through the lens of adulthood, Delia's entries take a wrecking ball to the perception of her parents' love story she'd long built up in her mind, uncovering a child's internalization of a failed marriage, poverty, and a mother come undone.







The novelist Rebecca Rosenblum lives in St James Town, Toronto — the most densely populated square kilometre in all of Canada. When the Covid-19 pandemic and ensuing lockdowns arrive, she's cut off from colleagues, friends, family, and not allowed to go near neighbours. As the world constricts, Rebecca keeps a weird and worried diary online — a love letter both to the outside world that she misses so desperately, and the little world inside St James Town that she can see from home.

As Rebecca watches and wonders from inside her box in the sky, her entries mix an account of a tough time in a tough place, joyful goofiness, and moments of unexpected compassion.

Rebecca Rosenblum is the author of the short-story collections *Once* and *The Big Dream*, and the novel *So Much Love*. Her work has been shortlisted for the Trillium Award and the Amazon First Novel Award. Rebecca lives with her husband, author Mark Sampson, and their two cats in Toronto.



The cultural impact of sport on a nation is not slight. Famous for a Time explores a number of important, if not well remembered Canadian athletes and the sports they played to help explain the nation's complicated history, sporting and otherwise. It is an exploration that reveals the socio-cultural trends that have shaped Canada since Confederation.

Through the prism of some exceptional athletes, the prevailing attitudes of many Canadians toward issues such as class, race, memory, manliness, femininity, and national identity are laid bare. Here, from the sidelines, we find how these attitudes have changed - or not, as the case may be - over time.

From team sports such as lacrosse, baseball, and cricket, to Canada's cycling craze, track and field, and boxing, each chapter offers insight to an important aspect of the nation's narrative. The winners and losers of Canada's games simply mirror the larger questions that have faced Canadian society across three centuries.

Jason Wilson is a bestselling Canadian historian and a two-time Juno Award nominated musician. An adjunct professor of history at the University of Guelph, Dr. Wilson has six books to his name and resides in Stouffville, Ontario.

Richard M. Reid is a professor emeritus at the University of Guelph. He is the author of several books including the C.P. Stacy Award—winning *African Canadians in Union Blue*. He resides in Guelph, Ontario.





Veteran *Toronto Star* editor Haroon Siddiqui, brown and Muslim, has spent a life on the media front lines, covering conflicts both global and local.

Siddiqui's journey took him from a divided India to a welcoming Canada — until the cataclysm of 9/11 hardened attitudes to Muslims around the world. His personal story weaves through growing Islamophobia in both India and North America.

Siddiqui's experiences in the corridors of power in newsrooms and warzones are threaded with insights about historic changes in the last seventy years in India and Canada. His native and adopted lands serve as metaphors for what can go wrong and what can be made right.

Haroon Siddiqui is editorial page editor emeritus of the *Toronto Star*, Canada's largest paper, and a senior fellow at Massey College. A member of the Order of Canada, he has covered or supervised coverage of Canada for fifty years through ten prime ministers, and also reported from fifty nations, including his native India. He lives in Toronto.



With over seventy stories of innovators in architecture, beauty, cinema, construction, employment, farming, finance, insurance, investment, manufacturing, media, music, pharmaceuticals, publishing, science, technology, and many more, *Black Enterprize* provides a comprehensive look into the stories of rule breakers and change makers.

Featuring cultural icons of their day such as Marcus Garvey, Madam CJ. Walker, Reginald F. Lewis, Berry Gordy, and many more, Miller provides insight into how entrepreneurship helped shape a new life and community spirit for embattled Black people across the globe during decades of fierce racism, segregation, and exclusion. These entrepreneurs went on to attain lofty heights despite the headwinds they faced.

Black Enterprize highlights the remarkable achievements of individuals such as early Hollywood producer Oscar Micheaux, traffic light creator Garrett Morgan, and a buyer of one of the first motor cars in New York City — Madam CJ. Walker. It also profiles presidential advisers like George Washington Carver and Booker T. Washington, as well as Granville T. Woods, who competed with Thomas Edison to create the hottest inventions of the day. Black entrepreneurs not only played a formative part of Black culture but also laid the groundwork for our contemporary cultural landscape.





A young writer on the cusp of adulthood is faced with cancer that keeps coming back.

Doctors used to tell him he was cured. That was a long time ago. Ever since he first left home, writer Jason Jobin has had cancer. Every five years, like clockwork, it relapses, and yet he always pulls through. Chemotherapy, surgeries, radiation; these are the milestones of his adulthood, of being "a special case."

It seems like every time he gets balanced — new writing, love, a job paying more than minimum wage — he's back in hospital. And he lives. Again and again, he is cured. It is miraculous. A great gift. But never enough.

Told in short glimpses, this story redefines what it means to survive. Jobin brings together the illuminated moments of loss and joy as he navigates chronic illness and builds from it something new and wildly unexpected.

Jason Jobin's writing has been longlisted for the CBC Nonfiction Prize and published in *Cleaver* magazine, *Pithead Chapel*, and the *Sun* Magazine. His stories have won a National Magazine Award and been featured in the 2018 and 2019 Journey Prize anthology. He lives in Victoria.

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












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
