Suffused with backstage gossip and cinematic history, and written in the style of a tell-all Old Hollywood autobiography, *The Majestic Sisters* is an authentic and stirring portrait of sibling rivalry during the Golden Age of Cinema and an impeccably drawn portrait of mid-century Halifax that will appeal to fans of Beatriz Williams and Brooke Lea Foster.







The characters in Sue Murtagh's outstanding debut collection of linked short stories are at a crossroads. Middle-class, middling, they wrestle with the consequences of their decisions and powerful forces outside of their control. Whether it's a volatile housing market, the ever-present threat of illness, or the slow disintegration of a marriage, this community of neighbours finds themselves trapped between the idyllic promises of the North American dream and the stark realities of modern life.

Mice infest every home a woman has ever lived in, no matter the domestic trappings. A charity golf tournament is an exercise in futility for a pair of married insurance entrepreneurs. At a community pool, profound grief manifests as rage. A grandmother's stories of generational trauma mutate in the retelling. And a suburban wildfire causes a young person to question the idea of home and the values of her parents' generation.

Packing the punch of a novel, these thirteen deftly interwoven stories scrutinize the lives of everyday people with surgical precision, while finding connection and community in the unlikeliest of places. Edited by award-winning author Alexander MacLeod, *We're Not Rich* is a wryly observed and deeply thoughtful collection, where nothing is quite as it should be, but everything feels true.

Sue Murtagh lives in Halifax. Her writing has appeared in *The Nashwaak Review, Grain, carte blanche*, the *Humber Literary Review*, and *The New Quarterly*. She won the Budge Wilson Short Story Prize in 2016. In 2020, she apprenticed with Alexander MacLeod through the WFNS Alistair MacLeod mentorship program. She then graduated with distinction in 2022 from the Humber School of Writers, working with Danila Botha. *We're Not Rich* is her first book



The Nowhere Places

By Susan LeBlanc

An incisive, skilful debut historical novel tracing the lives of a middle-aged woman and a teenaged girl through one pivotal year (1979–80) in North End Halifax.

It's 1979, and June has raised her son, Gerald, into adulthood as an unwed mother. She is in middle life now, sandwiched between Gerald—who is developmentally disabled and still lives in the family Hydrostone rowhouse—and her aging mother, Margie. When Gerald goes missing, it throws the family into chaos, leaving June shaken and open to the advances of a long-ago ex who's back in Halifax and looking to reunite.

Teenaged Lulu, too, worries about Gerald's absence from the pharmacy where she works. Lulu is reckoning with life as a girl transitioning into womanhood in this buttoned-up, patriarchal city. Her parents' marriage is on the rocks, as is her relationship with her best friend now that they've started high school. Lulu will never be cool, will always be threatened by the rough boys who live in her neighbourhood, will always live in a body that feels unwieldy and undesirable.

The Nowhere Places puts the secret stories of girlhood and womanhood—sexual violence, accidental pregnancy, shame, ambition, and yearning—centre stage, as they occur in the wild insecurity and shifting sands of Lulu's teenage life, and the powerful, decisive growth of June's middle age.

Lulu and June, though divided by decades, are both learning who they are and who they belong to—and what they might be capable of in a world still deeply unfair to women. And both find their solid foundations in their patched-together families, and the safe joy of female friends.

Moving, incisive, and set in a palpably real slice of Halifax, *The Nowhere Places* is a startlingly skilful debut novel—"a made-in-Halifax *Lives of Girls and Women*" (Carol Bruneau).

Born in Halifax, Nova Scotia, **Susan LeBlanc** worked as a newspaper and magazine journalist for twenty years. She later taught journalism at the University of King's College. In 2018, she was shortlisted for the Budge Wilson Short Fiction Prize, through the Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia. She was selected for the 2022 Alistair MacLeod Mentorship Program. LeBlanc lives in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. This is her first novel.



Living With Dementia

The Collected Columns of Darce Fardy

The collected columns from former reporter and head of CBC current affairs, illuminating his experience following a dementia diagnosis.

In 2013 Darce Fardy was diagnosed with dementia. He was eighty-one years old.

Fardy did not let the diagnosis get him down. Not only did he accept the situation and the likely consequences; he practically embraced them. As a former journalist, it was natural for him to document his experience. Over the next six years, almost seventy of his columns were published in the *Halifax Chronicle Herald*, serving as a window on his deteriorating condition.

But the columns revealed something else: the extent to which dementia touched other people's lives. Everyone seemed to have a story about a loved one who was dealing with some form of dementia—and readers were grateful for his insights.

Fardy kept writing until early 2020, when his ability to piece together a five hundred—word essay was finally out of reach. He died two years later.

Here, Fardy's columns have been compiled into a poignant and illuminating collection that serves to both honour him and destignatize the disease. Published in cooperation with the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia, *Living with Dementia* features forty black-and-white photos, a foreword and several columns by prominent Halifax geriatrician Dr. Kenneth Rockwood, and practical guidance from the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia.

Royalties from the sale of *Living with Dementia* will be donated to the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia.

Darce Fardy (1932–2022), was a long-time reporter, producer, and head of current affairs with CBC Television. His "retirement" after almost forty years with the CBC did not last long. Over the next thirty years he dedicated himself to two important causes near and dear to his heart: one, the right to access information held by publicly accountable bodies, serving as the first review officer overseeing the Nova Scotia Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act. The second, after being diagnosed with Alzheimer's in 2013, was helping others come to terms with the daily challenges of living with dementia.





This long-awaited memoir of a trailblazing emergency physician (otherwise known as "Doc Hollywood") and a former Nova Scotia Minister of Health also tells the story of modern emergency medicine.

When Ron Stewart—a coal miner's son from the east coast of Canada—took a residency in emergency medicine in Los Angeles in 1972, emergency care was still in its infancy. First responders—often dispatched from fire departments or funeral homes, with hearses serving as ambulances—could put on bandages and perform CPR, but that was about it.


Stewart took on a dual role as emergency physician and advisor (earning the nickname "Doc Hollywood") on the popular TV series *Emergency!*—where the fictional accident victims had a better chance of surviving than his real-life patients. Stewart's life's work was closing that gap, a mission he advanced by training the first generation of paramedics in LA.

After sixteen years of high-stakes trailblazing in the US emergency medical system, Stewart took on the Minister of Health job in his native Nova Scotia, where he battled long odds and fierce opposition to introduce a modern Emergency Health Services system.

In *Treat Them Where They Lie*, Ron Stewart and co-author Jim Meek tell a captivating story of passion and determination while exploring the highs and lows of a life well lived. With fifteen colour images, and forewords from prominent US physician and author Dr. Brian Zink and Canada's foremost medical journalist, Dr. Brian Goldman, this riveting memoir offers readers an unvarnished look at a man who played a key role in the development of modern emergency medicine.

Ronald Stewart is a pioneer in the development of modern emergency medicine. An internationally renowned expert in prehospital care and paramedic training, Stewart has served as a senior medical consultant to governments and NGOs in the US, Canada, the UK, Australia, and New Zealand. A Companion of the Order of Canada, Dr. Stewart has published more than two hundred articles on the art and science of medicine. He also founded the Music in Medicine Program at his alma mater, the Dalhousie University Medical School.

Jim Meek is an award-winning writer and author whose work has appeared in several publications. Jim was awarded a Nieman Fellowship by Harvard University and was a recipient of the Hyman Solomon Award, which recognizes excellence in Canadian public policy journalism. Meek wrote *Cultivating Success: The Life of Acadian Seaplants Founder Louis Deveau* and co-authored *Offshore Dream: A History of Nova Scotia's Oil and Gas Industry.*

Searching for Mayflowers

The True Story of Canada's First Quintuplets

A captivating, never-before-told true story following one woman's quest to unravel the 140-plus-year-old mystery of the first set of quintuplets born in Canada, weaving together history, intrigue, and a complicated family legacy.

On a blustery night in Little Egypt, NS, in the winter of 1880, a humble farmer named Maria Murray gave birth to five tiny but otherwise perfect babies—quintuplets.

The local townsfolk flocked to witness the miracle for themselves. Sadly, four of the infants died soon after birth. A photographer took a picture of the bodies placed next to their living sister. On the third day, the fifth baby passed away.

In the late nineteenth century, "curiosities" such as quintuplets were in high demand as entertainment. Circus showman P. T. Barnum sent a telegram asking if he could purchase the dead babies. The family declined, and, fearing grave robbers, dug the bodies up from the local cemetery and buried them in the basement of their home. Three months later, they exhumed them once again and buried them in a secret location.

When author Lori McKay's grandmother told her the story of the Murray quintuplets, McKay was enthralled. The best part: her great-great-grandmother had delivered the babies, although newspaper accounts credited a doctor with the delivery.

Featuring never-before-seen photos, *Searching for Mayflowers* is the captivating story of McKay's quest to unravel this 140-plus-year-old family mystery, weaving together history, intrigue, and a complicated family legacy.

Lori McKay holds a journalism degree and an MFA in Creative Non-fiction from the University of King's College. She worked as a magazine and newspaper editor for more than twenty years, and loves writing about homes, lifestyle, history, and local mysteries. Lori lives in Dartmouth, NS, with her husband, two young adult children, a few cats, and a friendly black lab. *Searching for Mayflowers: The True Story of Canada's First Quintuplets* is her first book.












Lunenburg, Nova Scotia

The trial exposed a dangerous world of drugs, greed, and misplaced loyalties—including a private investigator accused of switching sides. Sandeson was ultimately sentenced to life in prison.

He immediately appealed; in 2020, Sandeson's conviction was overturned and a new trial ordered. In a shocking twist, Sandeson finally took the stand, detailing in four days of explosive testimony how and why he killed Samson, and for the first time offering an explanation of what he'd done with Samson's body.





Revisiting B.J. Murdoch's The Red Vineyard

An annotated edition of the 1923 war memoir of a young Catholic priest in France from the author of *A Canadian Nurse in the Great War.*

Benedict Joseph Murdoch's *The Red Vineyard* was a captivating autobiographical tale of a young man's experience as a chaplain during the First World War.

As a young Roman Catholic priest from Chatham, New Brunswick, Murdoch became chaplain to the 132nd Infantry Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF), serving in Europe from 1916 to 1918. He was a sensitive and perceptive young man with an eye for detail; his war writing tells us not only of nurses and wounded soldiers; he also draws attention to the beauty of the French countryside.

The Red Vineyard was first published in 1923 and is one of only two Canadian first-hand accounts of chaplaincy in the Great War. It is republished here in full, with scholar and author Ross Hebb's valuable running commentary as well as an insightful introduction and epilogue, a helpful timeline, and a guide to persons mentioned in the work.


Murdoch's text reveals things we would not expect. Murdoch is exceptional in relating his combat stresses and his own signs of an ever-deepening condition of PTSD—well before discussions of veterans' mental health were commonplace. Hebb includes never-before-revealed details, including a letter from Murdoch's RC military chaplaincy superior stressing Murdoch's mental state and his need for a significant rest.

More than a war diary, A Canadian Chaplain in the Great War offers an exceptional window into the world of the time.

Although originally from Nova Scotia's South Shore, **Ross Hebb** is now a long-term resident of New Brunswick. A graduate of King's College and Dalhousie University, Dr. Hebb received his PhD from the University of Wales, Lampeter, in 2002. Along with volumes on Maritime Church history, he has also written about the golden age of shipbuilding at St. Martins on the Bay of Fundy. In 2014 he edited the collection *Letters Home: Maritimers and the Great War, 1914–1918*; in 2018, *In Their Own Words: Three Maritimers Experience the Great War*, and in 2021, *A Canadian Nurse in the Great War: The Diaries of Ruth Loggie, 1915–1916*. Dr Hebb is an Honorary Research Associate at UNB's Historical Studies Department. He has authored academic articles on B. J. Murdock and on the literary accounts of Canadian First World War nurses. Dr. Hebb is married and lives in Fredericton, NB.

Born in Chatham in 1886, **Father Benedict Joseph Murdoch** joined the Canadian Army in 1916. His exposure to combat made him subject to what was then called "shell shock." To exorcise his mind of the war's legacy, Murdoch wrote *The Red Vineyard* in 1922. Throughout the 1920s Murdoch continued to struggle. From 1932 onward, he found peace as a recluse deep in the New Brunswick woods. He died in 1973.

Van Gogh's Grasshopper

Van Gogh's Grasshopper is a collection of fifty poems about insects and other very small creatures. Each poem focuses on particular aspects of a specific tiny life form: their name and what it means, their overall design and structure, the superstitions we have about them, and their particular strategies to survive. The book is bound together through this narrow focus and the result is a most unusual and fascinating collection of poems.

Females are dominant in this insect world, and that crops up again and again; male insects are so unnecessary that we think of many such creatures as inherently feminine. The poems also take a look at insects and sex (their mating rituals), insects and death, dancing, music and insects, insects who shared extraordinary and little-known relationships with famous historical people (like Van Gogh), and the work of great naturalists and entomologists. Here are odes to insect beauty, the amazing feats they perform and their ultimate mystery.

Pacey writes in the footsteps of other great men who have studied and documented these so familiar yet strange creatures before – Vladimir Nabokov, Paul Brooks, Jean-Henri Fabre, Charles Darwin, C.J. Jung, René Descartes, and Baruch Spinoza.

Michael Pacey has been a fixture of Fredericton's literary scene for more than fifty years, publishing his early poems in *The Fiddlehead* while still in high school, and his first collection with New Brunswick Chapbooks while a sophomore at UNB. He did his MFA in Creative Writing at UBC where he served as editor-in-chief of *Prism International* (1984-85). In recent years he has produced four collections: *The First Step and Electric Affinities* (2011 and 2015, both from Signature Editions) and *Wild Apples: a Dialogue with Thoreau* (Pottersfield Press, 2022). The latter two collections were shortlisted for the Fiddlehead Prize at the annual New Brunswick Book Awards. More than a hundred of Michael's poems have appeared in Canadian literary magazines, and his poems have twice been recognized in the *Best Canadian Poems in English* series.

Harry Bruce's newest book is a collection of stories from a career that spans nearly 70 years in journalism, interviewing some of the most interesting and influential figures from Canada's recent history. He recounts his encounters with millionaires, prime ministers, movers and shakers.

Characters Along the Road finds its stories in the blustery halls of Parliament and on the wind-swept shores of Nova Scotia. Bruce follows the powerful players who've shaped his nation, alongside the introspective artists and explorers who search Canada's shores for inspiration. What results is a slice of Canadian history from one of its most accomplished chroniclers. Bruce's collection is replete with insight into the country's political and publishing elite from John Diefenbaker to Joey Smallwood, but still finds time to reflect on family, friendship and the wisdom he's found in stranger corners across the country.

Harry Bruce's adventures are likely to induce nostalgia, pride and fury for Canadians old enough to remember the triumphs and injustices contained in *Characters Along the Road* and provide new insight for a generation of younger readers better trying to understand the Canada they've inherited. It's hard to believe one life could touch so many important moments in history, yet Harry Bruce made it his business to find those characters he met along the road, and to tell their stories to anybody who would listen.

Harry Bruce is a prominent Canadian reporter, editor and educator. He has devoted most of his life to telling stories, many of them about Canadians. Born in Toronto in 1934, Bruce started his career as a journalist in 1955 writing for newspapers and magazines in Toronto until he moved to Nova Scotia in 1971. Bruce has been a heavyweight of Canadian journalism for almost seven decades. During that time, he has interviewed and worked with some of the most interesting and influential characters in the Great White North.



On the Eastern Shore of Nova Scotia, 69-year-old Jonas MacPherson lives with his pigeons roosting in his old cars, with the "pugilistic" ocean literally on his doorstep, and the memories of his late wife, Eleanor, still dancing in his head. He's lonely and the doctor has given him a year to live, but Jonas knows that this is not true. He's found a way to live in the past, with all the people he's cared about in his life. With no desire to eat, he reaches a mystical place where worlds converge, where he is again young and vigorous. He exists in "this temporal house," moving comfortably between the rooms, aware of the dangers of what he's doing but seduced by the rewards it offers: the memories and emotions he can relive.

Told episodically through significant moments in his life, MacPherson's tale reveals moments of danger, even of violence, but also those of profound love and intense longing. Always at the heart of his story is the nurturing yet unforgiving ocean and the beautiful ruggedness of the Eastern Shore. Is Jonas MacPherson suffering from dementia or is he finding amazingly creative ways to live out his existence? He himself is unsure. Whatever it is that he is experiencing, he is filled with energy, rage and humour as he looks upon his world, past and present, and recalls the memorable characters, adventures, and a pervading rugged gentleness that has guided his life.

Lesley Choyce is the author of more than 100 books of literary fiction, poetry, creative nonfiction and young adult novels. He runs Pottersfield Press and has worked as editor with a wide range of Canadian authors. Choyce has been teaching English and Creative Writing at Dalhousie and other universities for over forty years. He has won The Dartmouth Book Award, The Atlantic Poetry Prize and The Ann Connor Brimer Award and has been short-listed for the Governor General's Award. In 2022 he was awarded the Atlantic Legacy Award for his "lasting contribution to the development of the literary arts in Atlantic Canada." He surfs year-round in the North Atlantic.



Despite numerous obstacles, small-town girl Lenore Zann caught the acting bug early. She was "discovered" at 19 and chosen to play Marilyn Monroe in a rock opera based on the life of the tragic movie star. Her powerhouse performance kickstarted her career, leading to hundreds of acting credits in film, TV, theatre, radio, and animation, including her iconic portrayal of Rogue in the very popular animated series *X-Men: The Animated Series*.

A Rogue's Tale reveals the good, the bad, and the ugly in show business. It recounts her personal interactions with Stephen Spielberg, Tiny Tim, Craig Russell, and Rita MacNeil, dating celebrities Keanu Reeves, Andy Gibb, Lou Gossett Jr, and Page Fletcher, and working with award-winning actors and directors such as Sam Rockwell, Mark Wahlberg, Clark Gregg, Henry Czerny, Atom Egoyan, Antoine Fuqua, and other Hollywood heavyweights. Despite a successful acting career, in a strange twist of fate, like Marilyn Monroe herself, alcohol and drugs brought Lenore to her knees at the age of 36. But unlike Marilyn (who succumbed to her addictions at the same age), Lenore decided the braver choice was to live, which led to a powerful spiritual awakening and a new sense of purpose. This decision has enabled Lenore to fly to even greater heights on the magical wings of Disney.

Award-winning actor **Lenore Zann** has performed in theatrical productions across North America and in Europe with hundreds of credits in film, TV, radio, theatre, and animation, including her original one-woman play, *The Marilyn Tapes*, which she performed off Broadway. A tireless champion of the arts, women, and social and environmental justice, Lenore also served as a popular elected official for 12 years in both provincial and federal levels of the Canadian government. Her Private Member's Bill, An Act to Address Environmental Racism, was the first bill of its kind in North America. Beloved by fans around the world as the iconic voice of Rogue in the 1990s *X-Men: The Animated Series*, Zann is reprising her role in the new Marvel series *X-Men '97* on Disney+. What's the Point?


An Irreverent History of Point Pleasant ParkBy Stephen Laffoley

For more than three decades now, Steven Laffoley has trundled along Point Pleasant Park's twenty-five miles of paths, explored its fascinating geography, geology, and history, and admired its natural seasons in the birth, growth, and death of its flora. He has shared in its natural disasters, including brushes with voracious horned beetles and the harrying of howling hurricanes. And he has run along its paths in the sweltering heat of August, trudged through its knee-high snow in January, and inadvertently set himself adrift, shirtless and howling like a Viking, on its surprisingly fast-moving ice floes during a rare invasion of bergs in the harbour.

Yet, despite these memorable engagements, Laffoley knew relatively little about the park, at least in a narratively coherent way. So he set out to write about it, to meander along its muddied paths and pebbled trails to periodically stop and ask, "What the hell is that?" and "How in God's name do I get out of here?" That is to say, he set out to ask in the most meaningful way possible – physically, historically, geographically, naturally, and spiritually – "What's the Point?"

Steven Laffoley is the author of thirteen books. His *Hunting Halifax* was shortlisted for the 2008 Atlantic Independent Booksellers' Choice Award and the 2008 Evelyn Richardson Memorial Nonfiction Award, while *The Devil and The Deep Blue Sea* was shortlisted for the 2012 Arthur Ellis Award for Best Crime Nonfiction. *Shadowboxing: the rise and fall of George Dixon* won the 2013 Evelyn Richardson Memorial Nonfiction Award.

From Point A to Beware



In this quirky collection of unraveled travels, no U-turn is left unturned. There's trench foot, tick bite fever, supersonic diarrhea, hurricanes, runaway buses and thieving baboons. From being clapped out of a bar (not in a good way) in Santorini to a captain's request to be removed from a catamaran in the Seychelles, *Trips That Went South* is an unmatchable romp around the world with a live sex show, mud massages and some spelunking with a convict in between.

The author revisits daunting days on Croatia's harrowing Camino Krk, an evacuation in Iceland's Vatnajökull National Park, a jungle helicopter rescue and an unusual twist on ping-pong in Bangkok. She may be grounded by her parents after sharing some of these never-told-before accounts. Her travels over the last three decades have continually convinced several friends and family of places they NEVER want to go. Luckily she married a woman who was game for destinations that are on the no-fly list of most. Chasing birds, buses and dreams from an early age, Trips That Went South is a mash-up of travel wish lists, intestinal parasites, Camino pilgrimages, international volunteer gigs, desert breakdowns, gangplanks, tourist rip-offs, chimpanzees and beer foam premonitions. Along the meandering way, Torti digests a questionable menu of guinea pig, crocodile pizza, goat testicles, camel stew, piranha and fermented shark. Let's not forget pad Thai in Alexandra, Egypt, with a Christmas carol soundtrack in September! The search for her next strange pizza, primate, penthouse or pint is infinite. Torti believes that once-in-a-lifetime trips should definitely happen twice and her first curated collection of travel stories is an open-heart dissection of the rigours, rewards and random encounters that can only unfold in jungles and mountains far from anything familiar and comfortable.

Jules Torti is the author of *Free to a Good Home: With Room for Improvement; Trail Mix: 920 km on the Camino de Santiago; Been There, Ate That: A Candy-Coated Childhood* and *The Wisdom Found in Hen's Teeth.* She has walked the Camino Frances, Camino Portuguese and Croatia's Camino Krk and followed in the footsteps of chimpanzees, gorillas and orangutans. She's also made breakfast for 24 chimps in the Congo, kissed a giraffe (and a cod), designed a colouring book for the Jane Goodall Institute, been lost in the Costa Rican jungle and spent over a thousand dollars on merino wool socks. She wears a lot of hats, most of them backwards.


Finding Home at the Harbour

Such a Winter's Day

Six decades after leaving his hometown of Saint John, New Brunswick to follow his passion, Hank Lowman now spends most days sitting on the same bench in Kings Square as winter approaches. At a quick glance one sees an old man down on his luck, possibly impacted by a global pandemic, an economic downturn and a severe housing crisis. But not everyone just passes by. Liam, a young man on his lunch breaks from the Imperial Theatre, Bruce, a city works employee, Gloria, a local artist and lonely, vulnerable Pearl are just a few who stop and sit awhile, take the time to listen, notice his piercing blue eyes and uncover so much more.

Such a Winter's Day discovers the complicated and beautiful veneer of one person's life while at the same time celebrating the meaningful arc of social change and evolving gay rights. This is a story of challenge, ambition, love and heartbreak and a story of acceptance, forgiveness, friendship, and hope.

Susan White is a New Brunswick author. To date Susan has thirteen published books. Susan is also one of the ten authors featured in *The ANNEthology* (2024). Two of Susan's novels were shortlisted in the Mrs. Dunster Fiction category of the New Brunswick Book Awards. 

Thrust into the foster care system from an early age, Apple moves from house to house on Prince Edward Island without finding a home until she's a teenager and taken in by a couple who never managed to have children themselves. When she falls pregnant, her foster parents are keen to raise the baby with Apple still in the house—to live as a family.

That opportunity is torn from Apple by members of the Catholic Church along with social workers and government officials. Their vicious practices take the babies of unwed mothers and give them to wealthy families in exchange for large "donations" to the church. Apple's beloved baby ends up with a rich couple in the U.S., and is lost to her.

The Baby Train traces her life in the aftermath of that loss, raising subsequent children, creating deep bonds of friendship with other women struggling against society's rigid norms, and carrying underneath it all an unending love for her firstborn child. We also follow her baby's path, and watch his affluent, neglected childhood and then adulthood unfold. He never knows that his birth mother still yearns for him, still lights him birthday candles every year. The shameful legacy of forced and coerced adoption in Eastern Canada is brought to life in this sweeping sequel to *Ashes of My Dreams*.

Stella Shepard of Prince Edward Island developed a passion for reading and writing in childhood that followed her throughout life. She is the author of *Ashes of My Dreams (*Acorn Press, 2016) and her stories have been published in four of the *Chicken Soup for the Soul* books, Atlantic newspapers, and magazines. Stella is a journalist, a life-long learner, and a photographer. She is a mother and a grandmother who lives on an organic farm with her husband, Reg Phelan.

As a Mi'kmaq child, Richard Pellissier-Lush grew looking different than other the other Indigenous children. He didn't feel he fit in with the non-Indigenous or the Indigenous children he knew. But his mother continually reminding him that he was part of the Creator's plan empowered him to embrace his culture no matter what he looked like. Her chorus of encouragement stayed with him through his childhood and helped make him the man he is today.

Richard Pellissier-Lush is a Mi'kmaq man from Lennox Island First Nation, PEI. His passions are based on his Mi'kmaq culture, traditions, loyalty and love of the First Nations communities and his family, the Mi'kmaq People. Richard works with L'nuey as an Engagement Officer, his biggest strength is working with his Mi'kmaq brothers and sisters. He is one of the founders and original members of Mi'kmaq Legends, an all Indigenous Theatre Group that specializes in telling the stories, traditions, songs, dances, and culture of the Mi'kmaq from the past, and present. Richard is passionate about working with First Nation Communities to make sure the Mi'kmaq People know their rights, understand their rights, and help build a future for all L'nu that is strong and can flourish seven generations from today.

Jessica Jerome is a two-spirit graphic designer, born in the Listuguj Mi'kmaw First Nation, and raised as a member of the Mi'kmaq's of Gesgapegiag, located along the banks of the Gaspé Peninsula. Originally introduced to art as a way of dealing with grief, Jessica quickly became a skilled artist, earning certificates in visual arts, communications, and graphic design. Works as a freelance graphic designer/Illustrator and artist consultant. Her artwork is displayed in galleries and privately owned.

The story of how the world came to be on the turtle's back can be found in Indigenous cultures throughout North America/Turtle Island. It has many variations. This moving version of the tale—a story of resilience, sacrifice, and friendship—is one that Annie Picard was often told as a child by her maternal grandmother while they lived in nutshimit (on the land) in the Labrador/Quebec peninsula. Picard's lovely re-telling of this traditional Innu story of how little muskrat makes an enormous sacrifice to help the wolverine and his other friends rebuild the world after a great flood is brought vividly to life by Elizabeth Jancewicz's stunning illustrations.

After a great flood, wolverine will rebuild the world if only he can get a handful of dirt. Will the little muskrat succeed in reaching the bottom of the water to find the dirt when others have failed? **Annie Picard** is an Innu woman born in Sept. Iles, Quebec, in 1977; in 1980, after some very hard circumstances, she moved to Sheshatshiu, with her mother and younger brother. Upon her arrival there, she quickly went into the care of her maternal grandparents, where she learned to speak her mother tongue—Innu-aimun—and was taught about the very rich culture of her Innu background. She lived six months out of the year in nutshimit in the Innu homeland Nitassinan. One of her best memories of that time is when her grandparents used to tell her the legends of her people every night before bed.

Elizabeth Jancewicz grew up in Kawawachikamach and Schefferville, Quebec, and draws much of her inspiration from the flora and fauna of that area. After leaving to attend art school in New York, she retains close ties to her childhood by continuing illustrate books and curriculum from First Nations communities in northern Quebec, Ontario, and Labrador.


Anne Nuna started working at the school in her home community of Sheshatshiu in 1990 and continues to work there as an Innu-aimun curriculum developer. She also does a lot of other interpretation work for various organizations. The love of her language Innu-aimun was passed down to her by her mother. She enjoys doing this important work of keeping her language alive, and helping to ensure that Innu children continue to speak and read and write it.

In the album, a poem and photos that Sakari has never seen prompt the older woman to tell her the story of her younger sister who disappeared shortly after graduating high school. Sakari will help her nukumi to free herself from this heavy secret and allow the spirit of the missing young woman to fly away in peace.

Julie Pellissier-Lush is a Mi'kmaq storyteller, photographer, actor, drummer, best-selling author, and the first Indigenous Poet Laureate for Prince Edward Island. At her essence, Julie is a cultural teacher and knowledge keeper and through her books, songs, poetry and other creative pursuits, Julie celebrates and shares the powerful stories of the Mi'kmaq of Prince Edward Island. She has written several books, including *Mi'kmaq Campfire Stories of Prince Edward Island* (Acorn Press, 2020).

Originally from Quebec City, **Julie Gagnon** has lived in Prince Edward Island for over 26 years. She has held various positions in the French Language School Board and at the University of Prince Edward Island. Her teaching is rooted in social and nature-based pedagogy. *La petite robe rouge* is her first foray into children's writing.

Emma Hassencahl-Perley is Wolastoqwiw from Neqotkuk (where the two rivers flow beneath each other), also known as Tobique First Nation in New Brunswick. She is a Visual Artist, Curator, Educator, Author, and Arts Criticism Essayist. Her visual art mediums include beadwork, murals, and digital illustration. Through material and visual culture, Emma also considers her identity in her work as an ehpit (woman) and citizen of the Wabanaki (People of the Dawn) Confederacy. *La petite robe rouge* is her first illustrated album.


L'œil bleu



One for each letter of the alphabet. However, his teacher, Monsieur Bellehumeur, is far from impressed and returns his copy covered in red ink. Determined to convince him that his orthogaffes (spelling blunders) made sense, Sam creates a dictionary with character: A fictionary!

Danielle Loranger is a painter and author. Originally from Trois-Rivières, Québec, she lives near the sea, dividing her creative time between Boudreau Office, New Brunswick, and Hillview, Newfoundland.
