


Ice in Their Veins

Hockey wasn't meant to include girls. Women attracted to the speed, finesse and physicality of the game had to overcome condescending attitudes, lack of resources, legal barriers and even sexual assault in their quest for legitimacy and ice time. For more than 150 years, their femininity was questioned, monitored, hidden, disparaged and trivialized. Even so, teams were formed and stars emerged. Early tournaments were catalysts, inspiring pioneers with visions of what could be. From "the miracle maid" of the early 20th century to members of today's Professional Women's Hockey League, these are the stories of women who truly had ice in their veins.







A veteran diplomat, the author combines his personal experiences with those of his colleagues (Afghan and Canadian) to examine Canada's mission to Afghanistan at a human level.

Based on interviews with twenty-one key decision-makers and participants, many of whom are speaking publicly for the first time, *Unwinnable Peace* recounts the personal and professional challenges faced by individuals deeply committed to securing and rebuilding Kandahar province. Generals, diplomats, aid workers, politicians, interpreters—these are the men and women who are still struggling to reconcile their sacrifices with the eventual Taliban victory.

No one believes Marta can get better not her sister, not her father—and she doesn't care. But when a troubled, enigmatic acquaintance from her therapy group goes missing, Marta discovers what she does care about: finding Thomas.

For twenty-six-year-old Marta, group counselling is just a distraction from her dead-end job as a janitor and her serious vocation of smoking weed. She's been living with depression, numbness, and apathy for years.

In a rare act of engagement, she helps Thomas, a fellow patient who can't wash the dishes because of the man in his sink. When Thomas disappears shortly afterward, Marta feels compelled to find the person nobody else seems to care about.

Through a hard Nova Scotia winter, Marta embarks on a quest that takes her to doctors' offices, psychiatric institutions and the darker side of Halifax, where the homeless—the "Crazytown people of Sanity City"—dwell.

Is Thomas alive or lying dead under the snow? And is Marta really living or forever lost in the hypozone?



Tim Martin was the last Representative of Canada in Kandahar (RoCK). He previously served in various African countries and held ambassador-level positions in the Palestinian Territories, Argentina and Colombia. For his service to Canada, Tim has been honoured with three medals and the Award of Excellence in the Public Service for Canada's humanitarian assistance to Palestinian children affected by conflict.


New Adult

Ready for romance and adventure, two sisters take summer jobs as live-in wait-resses on the edge of the Arctic Circle. The big-city girls soon learn that the Klondike still exists, and that everyone at the Hotel Beringia seems to have a hidden agenda.

An outpost on the remote Dempster Highway, Hotel Beringia is the only stop for truckers, highway workers, adventurous tourists and scientists, serviced by staff who are all trying to get away from something. It's the 80s and everyone wants a piece of the Arctic, whether or not it's theirs to take.

Sisters Rumer and Charlotte each find romance in the midst of intrigue, but when Charlotte vanishes with her unsuitable lover, Rumer is the only "Klondike geisha" around and begins to wonder whether her attractive scientist is as honourable as he appears.

This is at once mystery and comedy, set during a pivotal time for women in the north and the drive to exploit the riches of the Arctic and its peoples.



Bound by blood and loss, three women struggle with lives fractured by a decadeold tragedy.





For Hunter Frank, the summer of '79 begins with his mother returning home only to collect the last two months' welfare cheques, leaving her three children to fend for themselves. When his older sister escapes their northern BC town and his brother goes to fight forest fires, Hunter is on his own, with occasional care coming from a trio of elders—his kohkums—and companionship from his two best friends.

My Indian Summer is the story of a journey to understanding that some villains are also victims, and that while reconciliation may not be possible, survival is.

He breathes life into his characters at their first mention and draws you into the gossamer web of his vibrant storytelling, from which there is no escape other than to read a story through to its end. DARREL J. MCLEOD

When she met a recruiter online, the doctrine of white supremacy supplanted the values of her middle-class upbringing, and Lauren traded suburbia for a life of violence and criminality on the streets of Toronto. Told from the viewpoint of both mother and daughter, *Walking Away from Hate* chronicles Lauren's life within the movement and her ultimate reconnection with her family.
